Mrs. Brownlee attended Kingston High School. She attended Chic School of Design and worked at several famed wedding gown manufacturing establishments, as a combined model and assistant designer.

While in that phase of designing junior dresses for Bonwit Teller, and sport blouses and shirts which had been made in Kingston. She moved into another phase of modeling, commercial photography and television photography. She married and had a daughter Ardis, who is familiarly known to her friends as "Pixie," who marked her 10th birthday on Bastile Day, July 14.

Her husband was David J. Brown, who had the largest beauty salon in New York City at the time. She became interested in public relations work at that time and "talked my way into a job" at the Studio Club in Mt. Version by promising a great art exhibit from Woodstock.

"The exhibit was great" Mrs. Brownlee said. "and included Woodstock greats John Pike, Eugene Speicher, Kan Downer, John McClellan and many others. This led to the modeling at the Hotel Delmonico publicity job, Alan Dale Kay Armen and others.

Mrs. Brownlee has among her students at the local airport attorneys, doctors, businessmen and women, teenagers and elderly including many prominent area residents. Some students mentioned by the flight instructor are Madeline Eyles, Janet Livingston, a descendant of one of the signers of the original Constitution, Dr. Patricia Wanning of Ulster Landing.
